Superintendent's Message

The Upper St. Clair School District continued our commitment to Customizing Learning, Nurturing Potential, and Delivering Excellence for our students, families, and community in 2013. This Annual Report to the community highlights our students' academic results as well as other important achievements from the year.

We are very proud of our students and staff, who continue to produce some of the highest test scores in the state on assessments such as SAT, ACT, PSSA, Keystone Exams, and National Merit Qualifying Tests. State level reporting of student achievement is shown on pages 4-5 of this report. In addition, the PA Department of Education website now hosts a comprehensive report on student academic progress.

Our District continued to expand our safety and security measures throughout all schools this year. Upgrades were made to visitor management, emergency communications, drills and preparation exercises, personnel training, and staffing. We count on the entire school community to assist with the safety of our students.

New to the Annual Report this year is a listing on page 2 of outreach initiatives that our students, staff, and parents provided for others. Our community can be proud of the many hours of USC volunteer time and the amount of financial support that has been dedicated to helping those in need.

As we prepare students for the future, technology integration becomes increasingly important. Attached to this report is information about our 2014 Celebrate Our Schools Gala. Every dollar donated through this fund-raising event will go toward the purchase of technology for our students. I hope that you will consider participating in this event. The 2012-13 Gala raised \$83,000.

Special Awards Received by School District in 2013

1. According to the Pittsburgh Business Times' 2013 Guide to Western Pennsylvania Schools, for the eighth consecutive year, Upper St. Clair School District ranked the highest performing school district in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, based on the Pennsylvania System of Student Assessments. Seventh, eighth, and eleventh grade students were top scorers in the state. For the ninth straight year, Upper St. Clair High School was named the highestscoring high school in the state based on three years of PSSA scores by juniors. For six straight years, Fort Couch earned the highest scoring eighth graders, and in the four years seventh graders have been ranked in the Guide, Fort Couch has landed the number one position three times.

- 2. Fort Couch won its fourth National Blue Ribbon Award. Supervisor of Middle Level Education, Mr. John Rozzo, and Fort Couch Principal, Mr. Joe DeMar, traveled to Washington D.C. to accept the National Blue Ribbon Award on behalf of the staff, students, and parents of Fort Couch.
- 3. The Pennsylvania Department of Education released a list of average SAT scores for 2012, and Upper St. Clair High School students earned the highest scores in the Pittsburgh region. The 343 students tested received an average verbal score of 568, average math score of 583, and average writing score of 576.
- 4. In recognition for the Student Leadership Academy, the School District was designated a first place winner of the 19th Annual Magna Award sponsored by the National School Boards Association's (NSBA) American School Board Journal.
- High School Principal, Dr. Michael Ghilani, was named 2013 Pennsylvania Principal of the Year by the Pennsylvania Association of Elementary and Secondary School Principals (PAESSP).
- Newsweek and The Daily Beast designated Upper St. Clair High School as "One of America's Best High Schools."

- 7. An "Award of Excellence" and an "Award of Honor" from the "2012 Excellence in Education Communications Contest" were presented to the School District's eBLAST electronic newsletter and school website, respectively, by the Pennsylvania School Public Relations Association.

New in 2013: School Performance Profile

The Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) recently released the Pennsylvania School Performance Profile (SPP). Posted at the PDE public website (http://www.paschoolperformance.org), SPP provides an academic performance score for public, private, charter, and cyber schools in the state. This performance score is designed with several purposes in mind:

- To inform the public of school performance;
- To provide a building level score for educators as part of their evaluation system;
- To allow the public to compare schools across the state; and
- To give schools a methodology to analyze their strengths and needs.

While public schools across the state have previously earned designations under the U.S. Department of Education Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 2001 "No Child Left Behind" legislation (e.g. Adequate Yearly Progress), schools will now receive an academic performance score based upon many data points. Test scores, progress in closing achievement gaps, and degree of student growth over time are factored into the scoring. Other identifiers of high achieving schools are also considered and factor into the calculation. These include graduation, promotion, and attendance rates, as well as evidence of offering rigorous courses.


2013 Business, Finance & Operations

Below are some highlights of the District's financial operations for 2013:

- No property tax increase was assessed in the 2013-14 school year;
- Countywide property tax reassessment resulted in a millage adjustment of 16.7%, changing the millage rate from 25.718 to 21.413 mills;
- There was a significant reduction of \$462,750 in federal revenue;
- State-mandated pension employer payments were increased by a net \$700,000;
- Contract negotiations with two unions (transportation and support staff) were finalized;
- Refinancing opportunity resulted in \$975,000 to be used to repair/replace the District's facilities including the stadium track; and
- Continued investment in student technology was supplemented by private funding.
