BAKER

ALL DISTRICT

According to the 2019 Guide to Western Pennsylvania Schools, published by The Pittsburgh Business Times, the Upper St. Clair School District ranks first among 102 school districts throughout the seven-county Pennsylvania region and third among the commonwealth's 500 school districts. The rankings, which were released on May 7th, are based upon PSSA and Keystone Exam scores – three years of data were used, with the current year given the most weight.
